COVID-19 and Dengue Fever Education

With the events of 2020, Fountain of Hope's (FOH) teams in cooperation with local authorities and district health departments, provided information and education about COVID-19 and dengue fever. FOH's teams reached 137 villages in 43 communes in the 5 provinces of Cambodia where we operate, through loudspeakers on tuk-tuks (two-wheeled carriages pulled by motorbikes), handing out educational posters and pamphlets, posting pamphlets in public spaces, and distributing educational materials through our local volunteers and cell church leaders. We provided Abate Larvicide from the Health Department to our local communities to combat dengue fever as well.



Fountain of Hope

During the 1970s, Pol Pot and the Khmer Rouge communist regime tortured and executed an estimated 2 million men, women and children, inciting years of civil war and United Nations occupation. Now, a small middle class is emerging, though heartbreaking poverty is still the norm. Half of the population is under the age of 25 and it is this generation that will greatly influence Cambodia's future.

God has made amazing progress in Cambodia during the past 25 years and Fountain of Hope (FOH) believes it can play a crucial role in winning this impoverished, war-torn country to Christ.

FOH works through local cell churches mobilizing community members to respond to social, physical, and spiritual needs with biblical principles. By sharing what they have learned with families, friends and neighbors, individuals demonstrate Christ's love, become natural leaders, and create a greater impact than FOH staff could produce alone. FOH's extensive volunteer network allows them to implement programs, identify needs, and distribute resources.



Flooding Relief

Extreme flooding struck Cambodia in the fall of 2020. Parts of the remote provinces of Pursat and Battambang got hit hard and were difficult to access. FOH staff took food and other necessities through tiny roads and even by boat to the people and villages who needed them the most. To relieve the need, 120 families from 16 villages received food packages. FOH teams continued to support these people by providing training through the Seed Bank project. This provided a sustainable support effort for those impacted by the flood.





JOY OF OUR CHILDREN

Spiritual and Health Education for Youth



Transformational Goal:
Children find their identity in Christ, have hope for the future and impact their communities by practicing healthy lifestyles and living Christ-centered lives.



Children ages 5-12

Bi-weekly neighborhood meetings for children ages 5 to 12 offer lessons about safety, health, hygiene and the love of God through songs, Bible verses, skits and puppet shows.

Teenagers ages 12-18

Teen programs focus on health care, HIV and the prevention of STDs, care for people living with HIV, improving self-worth, wise decision-making and planning for the future.

Buddy System

Teenagers and children from the Joy of Our Children (JOC) program are encouraged to participate with the Buddy System. This program is an opportunity for teenagers to serve the vulnerable children in their communities. Participants are paired with a younger child, a "buddy," and attend trainings on how to support and encourage their buddy. Their duties consist of mentoring, helping their buddy with homework, housework, and chores, along with emotional, spiritual and relational support.

*Pisey**

My name is Pisey and I am 10 years old. I joined the Joy of Our Children program in 2018 when my friends told me about it. I am so happy that my friends invited me to these events because I learned new things. I know how to care for my own body better; I shampoo my hair and now I always sleep in a mosquito net. I am happy FOH is in my village because I do not know of any other organizations except this one.

I'm thankful that through JOC, I learned new things and also received rewards like a book, pen, pencil, eraser, soap, detergent and shampoo. I am so glad that I can learn about diseases and better understand COVID-19, dengue fever and bodily hygiene. We learned how to work together to fight COVID-19 and dengue fever which relieves my fear. I now know how to wash my hands well with soap, I try to wear a mask and keep a safe distance as much as I am able.

I practice what I learn at JOC at home; I shampoo my hair, wash my hands and sleep in a mosquito net. I learned that my hair helps me look nice but also protects my head from the sun. I learned that if I do not care for my hair well then it would get smelly, have dandruff and lice. So, it helps to know about these things, so I can take better care of myself.

Other lessons were more difficult for me to follow. I know that having long nails could give bacteria a place to live. But, I like long nails. They look pretty. Through the JOC lessons, I learned to take care of my nails by washing with soap frequently, so that the bacteria will not stay under them.

I am thankful to FOH for all the lessons. I am happier and healthier because I participated in the JOC program. I enjoy the games, short plays and puppets very much. I hope that this program will continue in my village and community. I want to see my other friends receive good lessons about health so that they can live well every day. I am thankful for the JOC program, and I hope it will continue to educate other children. Thank you!

OUR STRONG VILLAGE

COMMUNITY ACCESS TO SUSTAINABLE RESOURCES



Transformational Goal:
The local church responds to the entire continuum of needs of vulnerable people across communities, so that community members can have access to sustainable resources.

Seed Bank

With an established local committee, the Seed Bank project enables communities to have a way to be good stewards of their land. Members from both cell churches and the community are trained with technical skills on how to plant, use proper fertilization, and care for their plants. After technical training, the members, especially those in need, receive seeds for planting.

Goat Banks

Goat banks are organized by an established local committee to address the needs of impoverished families or widows within a community. Widows learn how to raise and care for a goat, eventually receiving offspring from the goat. They are able to support themselves and raise their status in the community by raising the goats and the offspring the goats produce.

Savings Banks

Members learn how to plan their finances and save money as a group. Through a group savings, the members support one another while being accountable for loans and savings. So far, the project has supported families with loans to build a livelihood through purchasing chickens, sewing machines, seeds and other opportunities.

Moringa

Moringa is an edible plant that is used medicinally and as a dietary supplement for those who are malnourished or have common illnesses. Through OSV programs, cell churches and community members learn the benefits of moringa and how to plant moringa in their homes.

MEET
Sol

My name is Sol and I am 45 years old. I live with my husband and son, who is four years old. I do not own any large farming land, just the space around my house. I am part of a cell church. Before I participated in FOH's programs, I was quite desperate. I felt uneducated and my husband had to travel to faraway places for work for many months at a time. While staying home with my son, we searched for edible plants to sell and to provide for our daily needs. There were times when we had nothing to eat.

After I came to know the Lord Jesus through FOH, I joined the cell church and participated in the Our Strong Village (OSV) program. After I finished the OSV training, I discovered the resources I had around my house. I planted vegetables and my small land became a garden. In fact, all around my house became a garden. The FOH staff continued to teach and help me with my garden. Now, I have a family garden where the produce is adequate for me to sell and support my daily needs. The blessings overflowed and I shared what I had with my neighbors and cell church members, too. I saw the benefits of these vegetables firsthand. These vegetables are healthier for my family; they are all-natural with no extra chemicals added to them, making them safe for people's consumption. I am grateful that through the OSV program I received technical training and the seeds I needed. I get to serve the community by selling organic vegetables to them. I am happy that my family's livelihood is improving.

Finally, I would like to give thanks to the Lord Jesus and Fountain of Hope for the encouragement and new wonderful ideas so that I can learn to develop myself and my family. I can see that my cell church and community are improving as well. I am grateful that I have the privilege to know the true God and be saved from sins through faith in the Lord.

Vegetable Garden Project

Cell churches and community groups receive trainings from experts on how to efficiently select seed types, grow their produce, and care for the village garden. Some seeds are given to the group and shared among the community, especially to those who are in need. The gardens provide a healthier food source and a new source of income. This develops unity through the communal gardens. Those who are successful become a pool of knowledge and transfer what they know to others in their villages.



MEET
Kimhorng

My name is Kimhorng and I am 44 years old. I am a member of the Our Strong Village program. I joined the program when a FOH teacher told me I could learn about vegetable gardening. I wanted to learn more about how to grow vegetables effectively. Plus, I could participate in chicken raising training.

Through the OSV program, I learned about planting, how to make soap, and how to raise chickens. After the training, I planted pumpkins, gourds, cucumbers and cabbage around my house. I now raise chickens and make soap. I learned about growing other vegetables too but they are more difficult to maintain and too costly.

I love the program – it has helped meet my family's needs. I am more capable; I can do a lot and use the resources that I have. The FOH staff encourage me throughout the process.

In the future, I would like to learn more about raising chickens. I like OSV and I hope it will continue to be a part of this community. Please pray for my family to stay healthy. Pray also that the Lord will bless the work that I do raising chickens.

Chicken Bank

Cell churches and community groups learn how to efficiently raise and care for chickens. Poor families receive some of the chickens that are bred to begin raising their own. In this way, families are able to support themselves and have a way to build their income. Those who benefit from the program are encouraged to share their knowledge with others.

MEET *Ni*

My name is Ni and I am 49 years old. I am married and have three children; two sons and one daughter. I wash motorbikes and earn between 40,000 riels to 60,000 riels (10 – 15 USD) daily. When I heard about the Our Strong Village program, I got interested especially in the soap-making training. Soap is essential in my line of work. The FOH staff first taught me how to grow lemons. Right now, my lemon trees are growing quite well.

Later, the FOH staff brought us all together to learn about soap-making techniques. With eagerness, I participated. After the training, I began making my own soap! At first, I was worried that the soap would be unusable. Along the way, I sought the FOH teacher for support. My soap turned out really well – I am so happy. Before, I bought soap from the market, but now I can make it myself! Daily I need around 5 to 8 liters for work. I save money since I make it myself! My family uses the soap for their other cleaning needs as well.

I am so glad that the FOH teacher continues to encourage and help me. Through the OSV program, I now raise chickens. So right now, I have three successful jobs: chicken and fish raising, and motorbike washing. These various jobs have supported my family and allowed my children to be in school, especially when two of them are in high school (requiring a substantial amount of expenses). I have much hope for my family – and that my children will be able to go to university!

I want to thank FOH and the FOH partners for the support for these programs. I know that OSV has helped not just my family, but many others in my community. What I learned has helped my wellbeing and other needs within my community. There is a growing awareness and families are starting to grow their own vegetables as well. This will help keep families healthy. It is surprising to see a Christian organization doing such great work. I am intrigued and want to learn more about this faith since there are a few in my group who put their faith in Jesus already. Thank you.

MEET *Somrach*

My name is Somrach and I am 63 years old. I am a cell church member. I became a widow over 29 years ago. I have four children; two sons and two daughters. All of my children are married already.

The cow bank project has been a wonderful program for me. It is a great project for the poor and needy widows like myself. I am grateful that I received the loan of a cow to care for and keep its offspring. I used to have buffaloes. With the OSV training, I learned how to care for cows as well. Thank you, Fountain of Hope and its partners, for providing this program to poor widows. I am truly glad that I could be a part of this program – it has changed my life for the better. Caring for the cow has lifted my current conditions, especially now when I am at my old age.

As for my faith, I had not heard much about Jesus. Thus, it was difficult to understand why I needed Him. However, one day when a cell church leader came to share with me, and she came to invite me to participate in the Cow Bank Project training. There, I received more than just the knowledge, I received the good news! As I learned about Jesus, I noticed His character and how He cared and loved the people around Him. Plus, it was easy to see His love because of the believers at the training. They were friendly. After that training, I was intrigued so I continued to learn God's word at the cell church. I began to understand more and more about God. It was great too that the cell church is near my village. At the time, I was intrigued with the Lord rather than the cow bank, since I did not receive the cow yet. I am often reminded of these words, "If you need something, please pray and ask the Lord; He will provide". So, I began to learn how to pray for the needs that I have. Then, sometime later I heard that I was on the list to be a receiver of a cow. A month or so later, I received a cow. I was so happy and even more so because the cow was three months pregnant! Thank God for the joy in my life.

I am grateful to the Lord that He answered my prayers. I will continue to care for the cows as well as I can, so that they will produce healthy calves, and alleviate my needs too. The cow bank is wonderful. I pray that it will continue to flourish to support many other needy widows in other communities like it has for me.

SUPPORT GROUPS AND CURRICULUM TO ADDRESS COMMUNITY NEEDS



Human Trafficking and Migration Education

Children, teens and adults learn about trafficking prevention and safe, legal migration in their age-specific groups through the local church or community interventions.

HIV/AIDS and Domestic Violence Support Groups

People living with HIV/AIDS face discrimination, rejection, financial vulnerability and physical suffering. Those who become victims of domestic violence are prone to isolation and fear. FOH focuses on mobilizing and equipping local church volunteers to respond to these problems with the compassion of Christ. Local cell churches provide access to prevention and family value education, care for people living with HIV, support for orphans and economic assistance for affected families.

Community Leader Facilitated Meetings

Because Cambodia is considered a source, transit, and destination country for human trafficking, it is crucial to incorporate messages on prevention and child protection. Curriculum for leaders and influencers in the community provides awareness of how traffickers operate; instruction on the value of all people and tips for safe migration. The lessons also address domestic violence, alcohol and drug abuse and gambling.

Health Education

Local village and cell church gatherings receive preventative health lessons detailing how to deal with Dengue fever, diarrhea, malaria and other preventable life-threatening diseases.

Parenting

Lessons provide information about a child's growth and development and how to care for children. Additionally, the lessons address anger management and each person's responsibility within a family.

Transformational Goal

Establish healthy communities through a curriculum designed to raise awareness about relevant issues and promote positive behavior change in adults and teens. Community support groups emphasize prevention as they address trafficking, migration, HIV/AIDS, domestic violence, parenting and health education.

While in this program, I received great, valuable lessons. I was trained in the practice of "starting a fire," where we as a community learn to initiate practical activities to support the community. We received information regarding matters of migration, women and children's trafficking, drug and substance abuse, domestic violence, dengue fever, and measures of protection for COVID-19 and dengue fever. Through this vital information, I began to pay more attention to the needs of my family and community.

During the pandemic, I have worked hard to protect my community alongside FOH by sharing information and safety measures. As a vice-village chief, I am worried and tried all that I could to support my community so that we can learn how to fight against this new disease. I am grateful for the work and the cooperation from FOH. I am happy that the villagers heed the information and try to protect themselves as well.

I am grateful and feel proud to have programs from FOH. I see that it is very beneficial to my community. It has given me great aspirations I had not thought of before. I began to understand and reflect more about the problems at hand in my community. I am glad too that my community is healthier and learning new things through this program.

Mobilizing Volunteers

Through lessons and trainings, cell church members serve as volunteers in the community. They also take responsibility for church growth by sharing the gospel and dividing into new cell churches. They become agents of holistic transformation by sharing with their community the health lessons, social issue principles, and livelihood skills they have learned, practiced, and experienced for themselves.

Leadership Training

Formal training is available to increase cell church members' potential and capacity to become mature leaders. Members are equipped with biblical, agricultural, livelihood, health and social rights training.

Cell Churches

Cell churches are a form of house church where Christians meet together to praise, worship, learn, and grow together. A cell church consists of 6 to 12 members who meet in one of their homes. First, a FOH staff member leads and facilitates the cell church. Then, when they are strong enough, a trained and appointed local cell church leader leads the group. As the cell church grows, the members and their leader are encouraged to establish a new cell church. Cell churches demonstrate the love of Jesus Christ as they serve their communities.

Transformational Goal

Grow and expand the Kingdom of God through the multiplication of cell churches. New Christians encounter the reality of the Father's deep love for them, finding their identity in Him. Their own lives change with this knowledge and they are energized to reach their communities with the gospel and compassionate care. They join with cell churches with a commitment to become agents of transformation in the community. Cell churches intentionally reach out to every person and family in their communities, regardless of religion, age, gender, health, or economic condition.

MEET *Phearak*

My name is Phearak and I am 27 years old. I am not married.

Before I came to know the Lord Jesus, I lived for temporary things. I didn't think about what matters in life and enjoyed the pleasures of this world. I cared little about what was going on around me. Growing up, there were little events that I enjoyed. But, one day, there were this commotion and a loudspeaker that was playing in my village. I was curious so I went to find out. There was some program hosted by the blue shirt people (JOC staff). They had these puppets and fun activities for children. It was entertaining and different from what I was used to seeing. It caught my attention, and I observed from a distance. It was all fun until they told us about a man named Jesus. They told us about His love and how He gave His life for each one of us. I was not sure what that meant, and I did not know what to think of it.

I approached the staff and was introduced to another staff from the Life of Hope program. It was a great connection. Soon, I began to better understand Jesus and decided to accept Him as my Lord and Savior. I believed in the Lord, but as I walked with Him there were stumbling blocks that I encountered. I had doubts at certain times of my life. Though I knew God's love, I was still childish in my thinking, and processing what faith could do for me. As a result, I returned to my old ways of life. I was disobedient and faced many problems.

I faced many difficulties in my life. My mom was often quite sick. I did not know what to do because we were not a well-to-do family. Her illness took a toll on her until she passed away leaving me with nothing. My father left with another woman. I was deep in sorrow and regrets. Though I knew the Lord, I was still clinging to what I used to know. I sought fortune-tellers when I was faced with difficult situations and remorse. I met with fortune-tellers often until I could do what they do. I can make ceremonies and chant blessings and various other forms of witchcraft. I know all the big witchcraft. So, to be honest, I had feet in two different



boats, one in my previous belief and one in Jesus.

I experienced utter heartbreak when I found a sense of earthly love. I was betrayed, and I did not know how to cure it. It seemed like there was nothing in the world that could solve it. I tried all that I knew which I thought may help. I tried "showers of blessing", chanting, and you name it. Nothing helped. I was out of my mind. Then, I realized something. I had forgotten about Jesus. I forgot the truth about God. I went back to my journey with Him remembering what I had learned while I was in Phnom Penh. I remembered that God is love and salvation is sure. He alone can save me. As I reflected on the goodness of God, God showered me with His grace and love. I was once again whole. The deep hurt inside my heart began to subside. The grace of the Lord was indeed sure. I am thankful to the Lord for His faithfulness, even when I was unfaithful. My life turned over completely. I love the good news, and I love sharing his love with others. I began to see changes in my own life. I have the courage to tell others about Christ.

I feel that I cannot live without the Lord. Nothing seems to fill that emptiness in my heart except the Lord. I will try hard to live my life for God. I prayed earnestly for my family and others as I believe that He is the only true God. I want to give thanks to the Lord that He has indeed answered my prayers. Now I am truly happy that my nieces and nephews became believers in the Lord. We often lie to God, but God is faithful. He never lies to us. I pray that we will continue to have firm faith in the Lord. Thank you, God.

MEET *Kann*

My name is Kann and I am 46 years old. My wife is named Mao and we have two children. Both of us are poor farmers. We sell sugarcane (liquid) throughout the villages. Sometimes, we build pieces of drains and toilets, so that we could sell them. We also grow vegetables as a way to support our daily needs and for some income. Even with all these odd jobs, my family was still struggling. We still did not have enough. Yet strange things began to happen; my family was restless. We were troubled by constant quarrels and fights. Because of the fights and misery, I grew tired and did not care so much [for the family]. I did not think about my family anymore. I started to become a wicked person who drank and caused even more trouble toward my wife. My wife was tired and could not bear my selfish behaviors anymore. She went away and left me for over a month, because of my crazy drinking habit.

We began to study God's forgiveness and His love for us. I discovered God's plan for marriage. As we walked through God's message, I realized my divorce would leave my children like orphans and without warmth. I received much encouragement that day. Afterward, he prayed for me. Then, my heart was filled with God's forgiveness and love. I learned to forgive my wife. My heart became open once again. Suddenly, the teacher proclaimed, "Kann, you and your wife will be reconciled and be with peace".
